

# End-point assessment plan for Dispensing optician apprenticeship standard

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## Introduction and overview

Dispensing opticians are subject to statutory regulation by the General Optical Council (GOC). The GOC sets the standards of proficiency required for entry to the professional register and these are the occupational standards for registered Dispensing opticians. The GOC also has the statutory duty to set requirements of programmes necessary to support the achievement of the knowledge, skills and behaviours (KSBs) set out in the standards of proficiency and the KSBs in the occupational standard. The apprenticeship standard and the delivery of the apprentices training must be aligned to all relevant GOC standards to ensure that apprentices are eligible for entry to the GOC register on completion. It is against the law for anyone to work as a Dispensing optician without being registered with the GOC. The end-point assessment (EPA) assesses whether apprentices have also passed the apprenticeship and is based on the same professional knowledge, skills and behaviours as the occupational standard.

This document sets out the requirements for EPA for the Dispensing optician statutory integrated apprenticeship standard. It is for the end-point assessment organisations (EPAO) that must be a GOC Approved Awarding Body, who need to know how EPA for this apprenticeship must operate. It will also be of interest to apprentices, their employers and GOC Approved Awarding Body.

Apprentices will typically spend 36 months on-programme working towards the occupational standard.

The EPA period should only start, and the EPA be arranged, once the employer and GOC Approved Awarding Body are satisfied that the apprentice is consistently working at or above the level set out in the occupational standard and all of the pre-requisite gateway requirements for EPA have been met. It is expected that the gateway will be reached on completion of all qualification units except the final practical assessment.

The apprentice must have achieved English and maths qualifications in line with the apprenticeship funding rules.

The EPA period is expected to typically last 1 month beginning when the apprentice has passed the EPA gateway.

The EPA will determine the overall apprenticeship standard and grades of:

- fail
- pass

This apprenticeship has a statutory integrated EPA. The EPA will use the assessment arrangements in use for other entry routes into this occupation and will be completed simultaneously, as outlined in this EPA plan. Alignment of the integrated EPA is permitted because the following criteria are met:

1. Parliament has prescribed that the occupation (profession) must be regulated and a statutory regulator has undisputed control of access to the occupation.
2. The statutory integrated EPA meets the requirements of an apprenticeship.

## Gateway

The EPA period should only start once the employer and the GOC Approved Awarding Body are satisfied that the apprentice is consistently working at or above the level set out in the occupational standard.

The EPA period starts when the apprentice has completed the Level 6 Diploma in Ophthalmic Dispensing approved by the GOC except the final practical assessment and finishes when the apprentice undertakes the final practical assessment.

GOC use the pass list to verify successful completion of the apprenticeship programme.

The apprentice must have completed and achieved the following gateway requirements prior to beginning EPA:

- Achieved English and maths qualifications in line with the apprenticeship funding rules.
- Apprentices must complete the required modules for year 1 and year 2 and have sat year 3 theory assessments, taking into account any recognised prior learning, of the following approved qualification, as mandated in the occupational standard:
  - Level 6 Diploma in Ophthalmic Dispensing approved by the GOC except the final practical assessment

The apprentice will also have successfully completed a pre-qualifying period (PQP) portfolio and this will have been signed off by their practice and academic assessor, as well as successfully meeting the requirements of the practice visit signed off by an independent assessor.

The apprentice separately applies for full registration once they have achieved a pass.

## EPA

The EPA is:

**The GOC approved integrated qualification final practical assessment unit**

Independence of the EPA will be assured through:

- Ofqual
- the end-point assessment organisation will be the integrated awarding organisation

## Internal Quality Assurance (IQA)

Internal quality assurance refers to the requirements that EPAO's must have in place to ensure consistent (reliable) and accurate (valid) assessment decisions. EPAO's for this EPA must:

- appoint independent assessors who are occupationally competent across the whole occupational standard i.e. a General Optical Council registrant with appropriate post registration experience and up-to-date continuing professional development
- appoint independent assessors who have recent relevant experience of the occupation/sector at least the same level as a Dispensing optician. The independent assessor will have the following minimum skills, knowledge and occupational competence:
  - hold or be working towards an assessor qualification
  - have experience of assessing at this level
- provide training for independent assessors in terms of good assessment practice, operating the assessment tools and grading
- have robust quality assurance systems and procedures that support fair, reliable and consistent assessment across the organisation and over time.
- operate induction training and standardisation events for independent assessors when they begin working for the EPAO on this standard and before they deliver an updated assessment method for the first time
- ensure independent assessors attend standardisation events on an ongoing basis and at least once per year

## Re-sits and re-takes

In-line with the EPAOs (GOC Approved Awarding Body) procedures.

## Professional body recognition

This apprenticeship is aligned to the GOC Requirements for Approved Qualifications in Optometry or Dispensing Optics March 2021. This means that those who successfully complete the apprenticeship will be eligible to apply for registration with the GOC.

## Reasonable adjustments

The EPAO (GOC Approved Awarding Body) must have in place clear and fair arrangements for making reasonable adjustments for this apprenticeship standard. This should include how an apprentice qualifies for reasonable adjustments and what reasonable adjustments will be made. The adjustments must maintain the validity, reliability and integrity of the assessment decisions outlined in this EPA plan.
